Impact of Social Isolation on Your Mental Health

Social isolation can affect nearly every aspect of your mental health. Studies show that feelings of isolation can be linked to:

- <u>Suicidal thoughts</u> and suicide attempts
- Less <u>restful sleep</u>
- Decreased ability to <u>regulate eating</u>
- More <u>stress</u>, especially in the morning
- Greater difficulty paying attention and doing complex tasks
