

### Agriculture

#### Katie Wantoch | Associate Professor and Agriculture Agent, Specializing in Economic Development

The annual Western WI Ag Lenders Conference was held on January 6, 2022. Approximately 110 agriculture lenders, professionals, and educators attended the daylong conference that was offered both in-person and via Zoom by UW Extension educators and support colleague. One virtual participant noted, "I really liked the hybrid option for the conference this year (in-person and virtual). The virtual was well done - nice being able to see people at the conference via "cam video" plus the presenters themselves - much nicer than just showing slides on the screen... Made it feel like when I attend in person..."

Participants found the presentations more than useful (average 4.2, Likert scale 1-poor and 5-excellent) and the speakers to be very effective (average 4.1, same scale). One commented, "Thanks for your dedication in continuing to present this conference. Good job on running this hybrid virtual/in person conference. It was well presented." As a result of attending this program, participants plan to use something that they learned to help a client make a decision about a business opportunity or new enterprise (average 5.8, Likert scale 1=strongly disagree and 7=strongly agree), including carbon markets/credit information, market trends, and 2022 outlooks.

I have chaired this annual conference since 2011. In total, over 1,500 participants have attended and increased their knowledge of important farm management and timely agricultural topics at the beginning of the new year.

- An annual regional conference for ag professionals and educators, where attendees gained an awareness of the outlook for commodity prices. This conference was designed to increase their knowledge when advising their farm clientele in preparing for the upcoming year.
- A presentation for Chippewa Valley Ag Conference participants, where farmers learned ten things that can help them get started on their farm succession plan, have intentional conversations around farm succession, and develop future plans for the farm in order to help them be successful in their business transition.
- A podcast series, AgriVision, for farmers and ag professionals, where UW Extension educators answer Farm Management questions and share knowledge and expertise on how farmers can improve their farm management skills.
- A monthly column in WI Agriculturist magazine for farmers and ag professionals, where readers learn about farm management and available Extension resources. The purpose of this effort is to improve farm business decision-making.
- Updating and adapting a financial management curriculum for beginning, female, and other farmers into a more relevant format for use in-person, stand-alone educational videos, and an on-line course. This curriculum will assist farmers in identifying strengths and weaknesses of their business to assist them in making decisions that will improve their farm profitability.

## **Community Development**

It's been a great start to the new year. The DATCP Specialty Crop Block Grant was awarded to Chippewa Valley Produce, LLC to support Western Wisconsin underserved farmers. The grant will support the development of business management and capacity building for these underserved farmers. The Eau Claire Area Hmong Association Assistance, Black and Brown Womyn Power, and DATCP have been identified as partners.

I am continuing to do outreach to all three counties (Dunn, Eau Claire, and Chippewa) I serve. This month, I have been making connections with organizations dealing with housing issues in the Chippewa Valley.

- Planning meetings with the executive leadership of the nonprofit Literacy Chippewa Valley during which organizational needs are diagnosed and a strategic planning process will be designed. The purpose of this effort is to help the organization identify a strategic direction in order to more effectively use its resources to address regional literacy needs.
- Planning a statewide conference to support a Hmong economic development summit. The goal is to build a network of underrepresented entrepreneurs and business owners to learn and support one another.



#### Horticulture

**Horticulture inquiries** - So far this year, I have received questions on insects in the home, apple tree pruning and arborvitaes. In 2021, I had recorded a minimum of 300 horticulture contacts. Of these initial contacts in 2021 45% were made by phone. Email was the next frequent way folks reached out for horticulture advice. This was similar to inquiries that came specifically from Dunn County.

Overall, from the three counties I serve, tree related questions accounted for the majority of the recorded inquiries (21%). In Dunn County, horticulture questions spanned a wide range with no one particular topic standing out; though, questions on trees, landscaping and plant ID were the most common.

**2021 Master Gardener Mentorship Program** - I reviewed the feedback from new Master Gardener volunteers who participated in our 2021 Mentorship program pilot. Results showed that 86% of survey respondents found that the mentorship had helped them become better familiar with their local Master Gardener Program. The same amount also stated that the mentorship helped facilitate their involvement in volunteer service. This is good news as one of the primary objectives of the mentorship program was to help acclimate new volunteers and get them quickly involved with local Master Gardener activities as this has been shown to help with volunteer retention.

**Developing new educational opportunities** – I serve on a committee that is developing a series of horticulture mini webinars for the 2022 growing season. The webinars are called mini because they last approximately 30 minutes including Q&As. The webinars are free. The first round focuses on fruit and starts at the end of February. **Professional development** – I attended the Toward Harmony with Nature Conference and found great inspiration while listening to the keynote, Dr. Douglas Tallamy, share how homeowners can incorporate wildlife conservation into their yard no matter how small the space. We can garden in ways that support native ecosystems and support pollinators, birds etc. Other speakers at the conference spoke on incorporating native species in your yard for both ecosystem health and year-round interest, lawn alternatives to KY bluegrass and fescue and utilizing rain gardens.

FoodWIse continues to support the virtual Tues/Thurs StrongBodies series that started in January with leading, providing nutrition lessons, and setting up speakers.

Sandy completed end of year impact reports for each of the counties. This report will be submitted to our annual Extension County Board Report. She is also beginning the planning process for FY23 by updating our 3- yr action plan and equity reflection.



- A virtual nutrition education planning session in collaboration with the Dunn and Chippewa County Women Infant & Children (WIC). The goal of this effort is to design a series of lessons to help parents of young children (WIC participants) share and discuss ways to make healthy snacks and create mealtime harmony.
- Strategic planning meetings with the Health Dunn Right- Chronic Disease Prevention Action Team during which annual goals and objectives were reviewed. The purpose of this effort is for the team to identify a strategic direction in order to more effectively guide its resources in meeting goals and objectives during the upcoming year.

### Human Development and Relationships

- A 4-hour online class for parents in a legal court case for divorce, placement change, child support or paternity, where they learn about the effects of family transitions on children and how parents can minimize problems for their children through cooperative co-parenting strategies.
- A weekly virtual drop-in session for participants who have taken a resiliency skill building focused class, workshop, or series with Extension (i.e. WeCope, Farm Stress, etc.) and general community members interested in self-care, where participants learn skills such as deep breathing, guided imagery, values exercises, gratitude meditations, etc.. The purpose of these sessions was to reduce stress and increase self-awareness, and help sustain learnings and practices learned in previous Extension educational opportunities.

## Positive Youth Development

What is happening in 4-H land right now, in the depths of winter? Planning and more planning for spring and summer! Summer camp with Clark, Eau Claire and Dunn 4-H at Kamp Kenwood in early June involves a lot of meetings especially for marketing, and recruitment of counselors and adult volunteers (and we need to find a good camp cook!). The Tri-County Performing Arts Festival goes live at Cadott Highschool at the end of February - so we are busy taking applications to perform and lining up volunteers to help that day go smoothly. UW-Stout art educators are back to teach 6 art classes via Zoom this spring. Stout is recruiting the student teachers and planning curriculum for classes that start in March and will end with an in person student art show at the university in April. I've continued to offer hands-on 4-H activities to the Boys and Girls Club that meets at River Heights Elementary and am enjoying spending time with these energetic and enthusiastic youngsters.

Eau Claire and Dunn are teaming up to offer a Middle School Leadership Day coming up March 19th at Beaver Creek Reserve - it will focus on interactive games and learning about the many ways to lead. The youth in the Hmong after school club voted to keep going after school is out by forming a 4-H club - some of the youth are already talking about what projects they want to take to the county fair!

• Ongoing support for an afterschool club for Hmong youth which builds community through 4-H activities, mindfulness moments, and goal setting activities. The goal of this effort is to support youth mental health and to keep youth connected to their peers and caring professionals.



• A twice a month set of activities for children grades 1-4 where they participate in 4-H Cloverbud activities at a Boys and Girls Club. This program promotes participation in area 4-H to a diverse audience.

The Boys & Girls Club in Menomonie really enjoyed having 4-H join our programming. Our members enjoyed learning about the Jack in the Beanstalk story through their drawings and elaborate movements to accompany the story. They were all excited to use their body to animate the story.
