

February 2022 Report

Agriculture

Katie Wantoch | Associate Professor and Agriculture Agent, Specializing in Economic Development

Over 200 farmers, agriculture professionals and educators from over 30 Wisconsin counties registered for a Farm Management three-part webinar program focusing on farm financial and risk management, with over 160 viewing the live and/or recorded series in January 2022.

As a result of attending this program, participants of the evaluation (N=44) indicated they learned about the purpose and value of financial and risk management practices (61% strongly agreed, 39% agreed). They learned some ways to determine whether a business opportunity is likely to succeed (48% strongly agreed, 43% agreed). They plan to use something they learned to help make a decision about a business opportunity or new enterprise. (26% strongly agreed, 62% agreed). Participants included farmers (30%), ag professional/service provider/consultant (18%), educators (33%), and others (10%).

As a result of the program, some of the actions that participants said they plan to apply to their farm, or farms they work with, include:

- Risk aversion techniques, look at the risk rating tools
- Take the time to address sensitive issues
- Look at my trend and my assets and how I'm using them, where I can do better
- Focus on the important ratios to start with, and this will help find areas to focus on improvements!
- Make a spreadsheet of costs and profits
- Implement price floors for 2022
- A series of webinars for farmers, agriculture professionals and educators where they learned about farm-scale economics for agriculture markets in 2022, the purpose and value of having basic financial statements for their business, and resources and tools to assess their business in order to make informed financial and risk management decisions.
- A training for people in Dunn County who use pesticides to produce an agricultural commodity on property they or their employer owns or controls, where participants learn to safely apply restricted-use pesticides. The goal of this program is to increase personal safety of employees and farmers who use pesticides.
- A podcast series, AgriVision, for farmers and ag professionals, where UW Extension educators answer Farm Management questions and share knowledge and expertise on how farmers can improve their farm management skills.
- Updating and adapting a financial management curriculum for beginning, female, and other farmers into a more relevant format for use in-person, stand-alone educational videos, and an on-line course. This curriculum will assist farmers in identifying strengths and weaknesses of their business to assist them in making decisions that will improve their farm profitability.

Community Development

This month was the second of three planned winter virtual meetings "Exploring Capacity to Serve Wisconsin HMoob Farmers. It had a great turnout with a lot of organizations throughout Wisconsin who are either already supporting or looking into how to support Hmong Farmers. The discussions will continue next month March 15, 2022 that will conclude



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the workshop with a potential fourth meeting to be determined.

- An educational program for underserved Hmong Farmers, where they learn how to complete financial documents and learn of financial resources to support their farm businesses. The goal is to reduce challenges and barriers to support and/or expand underserved farm operations with introduction of financial practices and increased knowledge to access financial resources.
- Planning a statewide conference to support a Hmong economic development summit. The goal is to build a network of underrepresented entrepreneurs and business owners to learn and support one another.
- Planning meetings with the executive leadership of the nonprofit Literacy Chippewa Valley during which organizational needs are diagnosed and a strategic planning process will be designed. The purpose of this effort is to help the organization identify a strategic direction in order to more effectively use its resources to address regional literacy needs.
- Planning for a series of virtual FEED workshops for food business entrepreneurs in Wisconsin. The goal of this effort is for entrepreneurs that are considering expanding or starting a food based business to learn about types of food business and what is involved in operating these types of business so that they can decide if they want to pursue their business idea and what it would entail.

Horticulture

Horticulture inquiries - So far this year, I have received questions on insects in the home, apple tree pruning and landscape plant selection. In 2021, I had recorded a minimum of 300 horticulture contacts. Of these initial contacts in 2021 45% were made by phone. Email was the next frequent way folks reached out for horticultural advice. This was similar to inquiries that came specifically from Dunn County. From the three counties I serve, tree related questions accounted for the majority of the recorded inquiries (21%). In Dunn County, horticulture questions spanned a wide range with questions on ornamentals, trees, plant ID, lawns, landscape and fruit topping the list.

2021 Master Gardener Mentorship Program - I reviewed the feedback from new Master Gardener volunteers who participated in our 2021 Mentorship program pilot. Results showed that 86% of survey respondents found that the mentorship had helped them become better familiar with their local Master Gardener Program. The same amount also stated that the mentorship helped facilitate their involvement in volunteer service. This is good news as one of the primary objectives of the mentorship program was to help acclimate new volunteers and get them quickly involved with local Master Gardener activities as this has been shown to help with volunteer retention.

Developing new educational opportunities – I serve on a committee that is developing a series of horticulture mini webinars for the 2022 growing season. The webinars are called mini because they last approximately 30 minutes including Q&As. The webinars are free. The first round focuses on fruit and starts at the end of February. • Planning for a statewide webinar series for consumer horticulture audiences where participants will learn about pollinator decline, climate change and environmental contamination and pollution. The goal of this effort is to increase adoption of horticultural practices addressing identified environmental issues in Wisconsin.

Human Development and Relationships

February has been a month filled with sunsetting projects and creating succession plan resources for people to pick up the projects I am currently leading or co-leading. I am focusing on ending my time with Dunn County strong and setting the new person up for success. Activities include but are not limited to creating a succession planning document for Health Dunn Right, the Community Health Needs Assessment, and my other classes and projects like Parents Forever, Practicing the Pause, and Making Reading Memories. My wish is for the new person in this role to be so prepared and armed with the correct information that they will be able to hit the ground running.

- A 4-hour online class for parents in a legal court case for divorce, placement change, child support or paternity, where they learn about the effects of family transitions on children and how parents can minimize problems for their children through cooperative co-parenting strategies.
- A weekly virtual drop-in session for participants who have taken a resiliency skill building focused class, workshop, or series with Extension (i.e. WeCope, Farm Stress, etc.) and general community members interested in self-care, where participants learn skills such as deep breathing, guided imagery, values exercises, gratitude meditations, etc.. The purpose of these sessions was to reduce stress and increase self-awareness, and help sustain learnings and practices learned in previous Extension educational opportunities.

The goal of this 6 session hybrid activity is to give local youth, in grades in Kindergarten through 12th, the chance to work in age-appropriate break out rooms with college students who are art educators and to show their best work on the college campus at the end of the series.
- Ongoing support for an afterschool club for Hmong youth which builds community through 4-H activities, mindfulness moments, and goal setting activities. The goal of this effort is to support youth mental health and to keep youth connected to their peers and caring professionals.
