### Popple Creek - Jan.

We met at Popple Creek Church. We discussed how our members enjoyed the Christmas Tea. and the raffle donations from our club: Chris provided the beautiful quilt, and 2 baskets were also provided, along with 3 kinds of Mexico cookies for the country we chose.

We had a discussion of favorite casseroles during roll call. Connie read a poem "Old Folks are Worth a Fortune" Maureen shared info about the Train of Life. Lana shared material from the AARP Bulletin on Original Medicare vs. Medicare advantage plans which covered pros and cons of each and considerations to make before switching coverage.

Popple Creek-Feb. We met at Colfax Methodist Church. Connie distributed the membership roster to each member.

Gen updated us on giving to Nicaragua. Each county is allowed one shoe box size box to be brought to the state meeting. Any other donations must be taken to Stevens Point by personal vehicle.

A collection of items for our years project "Wildlife Rescue and Rehab" was taken. Bird seed and suet is what is needed at this time of the year, along with cash donations.

We discussed the Winter Olympics during roll call. Geri read "Words of Wisdom" which was written by a 90-year-old woman. Lana shared material from the DNR website on Household Battery Recycling. Before disposal each battery should be put into a clear plastic or each battery's terminal should be taped with clear packing tape and stored in a nonmetal container to prevent fire and battery leakage of chemicals. Swollen or damaged batteries should be stored in sand or kitty litter. Take stored batteries to recycling or battery stores; there may be a cost to you. Single-use alkaline batteries have little recycling value and may be safely thrown in the

trash. Also: Always unplug cell phone charger when not charging the phone as a lot of heat comes from the charger and has caused house fires.

Popple Creek-Mar. Geri updated us that changes are being considered for the HCE scholarship to post secondary students; which the scholarship committee will do in the near future.

The District meeting was discussed, with questions of what we need to do as club to help with the meeting. Geri will relay any new info she receives.

Spring Fling will be held May 4 at the Government Services Center (formerly Dunn Cty Health Care and Community Services). There will be no meal this year. there will be light refreshments.

### SOUTH CENTER

Cedarlings-Jan. Cultural Arts: Julia d'Angelo-Woodford detailed events in the area highlighting Chippewa Falls hosting the Wisconsin Regional Art Program Exhibit. The Wisconsin Regional Art program will bring the Chippewa Valley Regional portion of their competition to Chippewa Falls for the first time this October. held at the Heyde Center for the Arts Oct 13-Nov 18 with goal to introduce younger artists to the Chippewa Valley arts scene to foster the next generation of talent in the area. A public reception including an opportunity to meet the artists, alongside music and a silent auction, will be held on Saturday, Nov. 5 at the Heyde Center for the Arts.

Safety. Joyce Kettner explained the unpredictable weather patterns and how we need to be aware of other vehicles and be slowing down more as ice melts and then freezes again.

Health: Julia stated that Mayo Clinic is still mandating Masks in the clinic and for all appointments. The government released free masks to the public to be given out at area businesses. Walmart gives out these free masks and they are very nice. The government is also providing 2 sets of 4 free at-home test kits per household. International/Public Information: Melanie Yager presented a fun fillin fact sheet created from website www.usdebtclock.org. on the subject of debt in America including statistics on the average debt of Student loan debt, credit card debt, family savings, personal debt, and citizens without health care. We also discussed what the government budget is for Medicare, Social Security, Defense Budget and the Net Interest of Debt; numbers of the population breakdown such as Retirees, Disabled, Less than 19 yrs old, and Age 18-64 and that 85% are employed and 39 million are in poverty; and other interesting details like 1 in every 15 people are millionaires and 11% of the population are living in poverty.

What's Happening in Menomonie: Vicki Maves gave a hand out of ideas of things to do in the Dunn County area detailing handy pieces of information including when and where to find community free meals. Winter Hours of the Farmers market, Mable Tainter theater info and where to find Technology Assistance help. She lists details of the Menomonie Light Parade Driving tour stops that were pulled from Menomonie Parks and Rec Dept. resources.

<u>Cedarlings-Feb:</u> Cultural Arts: Julia reports that because of covid many art galleries have not been able to remain open. How we display and experience art has changed significantly. Many artists have had to resort to selling their work online. She expressed the importance of attending art

gallery events both online and in person. She made reference to a website that has important news and resources for artists. www.ArtsWisconsin.org is an organization devoted to keeping Wisconsin's Creative Economy Strong. They explain the value of art by stating in their website. "Investing in the arts, culture, and creativity helps build and sustain economic vitality, education in the 21st century, healthy vibrant communities, and opportunities for all throughout Wisconsin." Safety: Joyce Kettner reminded us to make sure we have our lights on while driving during a snowstorm. It was also reported to be wary of free face masks scams in which you are asked to give your Medicare number.


International/Public Information: Melanie Yager shared info about 'air tags'. They are about the size of a bottle cap. They pick up on your phone signal that allows others to track where you are. They have good uses such as keeping track of where your children are. However, burglars can drop them in your purse to find where you live and rob your home- particularly if you appear wealthy.

Melanie shared poem "The Hill We Climb" by Amanda Gorman that was recited at the State of the Union Address in Jan. 2021.

What's Happening in Menomonie: Vicki Maves put together a handout that details events happening in and around the Menomonie area Menomonie through February.

Other Topics of Interest: Rosalie Werner attended as a guest of our meeting. Distributed Ruth B. Sayre Scholarship application and HCE Pamphlet that can be used to give an overview HCE to encourage potential new members. We also talked about the value of information from the HCE website and what is going on in the larger organization picture.

Cedarlings-Mar: Julia spoke about the science of Cymatics-the study of sound waves and Cymatic frequencies & its effects on matter. She presented a YOUtube video of instrumentalist who performed music while simultaneously manipulating the shape of water. fire, electricity, and produced vibrations attached to vibrations of instruments. That performance and visual artists like herself are using the science of cymatics to manipulate matter to produce works of art or to enhance the art of instrumental performance. In her latest work, Julia and her husband James Woodford will be working with band and choir students from Colfax HS, Grade School, and middle school to create a visual representation of the sound produce by the individual instrumentalist or vocalists thereby producing a type of musical thumbprint or musical self portrait of sorts. Here is a photo of the type



of visual patterns that can emerge Rosella Blakley will turn 100 in May. We voted to donate a set of Bookworms in honor of her 100<sup>th</sup> birthday.


### **Member and Board Information**


