And I have continued to engage with the farmers market in Dunn County and getting to know the vendors and how to best support them.

Horticulture

Our late season mini webinars are finishing up. The Horticulture Program offered a series of mini webinars throughout the growing season covering a variety of gardening topics. Mini webinars are 30 minutes and have been hugely popular. The final webinar, Bringing the Garden Inside, discusses bringing your plants indoors with information on which plants can come in, the requirements for growing plants indoors, and how to properly transition them to their new indoor home. This webinar is on September 7 at noon.

Other topics in the late season webinars included Yard and Garden Cleanup with Diseases and Insects in Mind that discussed best practices for fall cleanup to reduce insect and disease issues next year and Fall "Lawndry" List that discussed fall lawn TLC. We are in the process of updating outreach materials to promote the WI Master Gardener program and the Dunn County Master Gardeners. This is much needed to reflect current changes in the program and elevate all the wonderful activities the Master Gardeners are doing in Dunn County. A huge shout out to Michelle for her help on this project!

The 6-week youth garden programs I do in partnership with the Boys and Girls Club and FoodWIse at the River Heights Elementary school and the Chippewa Falls Community Garden have finished for the season. When asked what they liked most about garden club, 52% responded gardening activities, 40% said food sampling with the remaining stating learning new things and/or everything!

Yard and garden questions are still rolling in and include questions on plant ID, vegetable diseases, tree diseases, fruits, insects and wildlife.

Professional Development in August included a training on Hostile and Intimidating (HIB) Policies and Processes, which introduced the characteristics of Hostile and/or Intimidating Behavior as defined by UW Madison, and processes and resources available if someone is experiencing, witnessing or accused of HIB. I also attended a training on Cybersecurity.

For September, I'll be teaching labs for the Foundations in Gardening course, which starts this month, helping to install a native rain garden at Lake Wissota State Park and doing outreach on healthy soils, soil testing and best practices on garden clean up at community gardens.

- Multiple educational events at the Menomonie and Chippewa Falls Farmers Markets with WIC families. The goal of this effort is to support parents on the benefits of children eating healthy foods, provide information on the WIC vouchers and SNAP/EBT token programs, and promote families to trying more produce and fresh foods at the market.
- A collaborative effort with Chronic Disease Prevention Action Teams under the Eau Claire Healthy Communities, Health Dunn Right, and Chippewa Health Improvement Partnership coalitions to promote our 2022 Summer Activity Passport. This effort helps promote community engagement in summer activities that promote increased physical activity, increased fresh produce access and consumption, and stress reduction as action steps to reduce chronic diseases.
- Monthly meetings with the Chronic Disease Prevention Action Teams under the Eau Claire Healthy Communities, Health Dunn Right, and Chippewa Health Improvement Partnership coalitions. This effort helps guide the action teams in providing community awareness and activities concerning healthy food access, food security, and increased physical activity for local families.
- Monthly Steering Committee meetings with the executive leadership of the Chippewa Healthy Improvement Partnership and Health Dunn Right during which organizational needs are reviewed and discussed. The purpose of this effort is to help the organization identify a strategic direction in order to more effectively guide its action teams including the Chronic Disease Prevention Action Teams.
- Collaboration with local agencies to create sustainability and promotion of the farmers markets token and match programs. This effort enables FoodShare participants to utilize their benefits in purchasing market foods while supporting increased vendor sales.

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Human Development and Relationships

Parents Forever is a 3-4 hour co-parenting course designed to help parents who are sharing children after a divorce or other custody change take better care of their children, and themselves while developing a healthier co-parenting relationship with the other parent. Parents may be court ordered or may sign up because they want to improve their understanding of how to co-parent in a positive way.

Attendees at two different in person class offerings rated the usefulness of the topic as a 5 (very useful). Participants rated their knowledge of co-parenting before the class as between zero knowledge and a little knowledge (average of 1.5) and rated their knowledge after the class was completed as very knowledgeable (5).

When asked what the participants might tell other parents about the program one said: "it is essential" and another remarked that it is a "great program" and "there needs to be a longer course."
