

What is 4-H?

4-H is the nation's largest positive youth development organization. 4-H empowers young people grades K-13 to reach their full potential as a community of young people across America while learning citizenship, leadership, and life skills. 4-H welcomes new members from towns, cities, and rural areas. We learn by doing through hands on projects, activities, and adult mentorship. 4-H's history and roots are in agriculture, but today's 4-H programs have a new focus on healthy living, personal growth, science, engineering, and technology programs.

What is a 4-H Club?

A 4-H Club is made up of five or more youth guided by adult volunteer leaders, partner organization staff, or University of Wisconsin Extension Educators. 4-H clubs follow a proven program model and offer learning opportunities that are youth-directed. Members elect officers to lead their club meetings and activities. The main purpose of the 4-H club is to develop life skills through enriching experiences at home and in the community. Most clubs meet monthly.



What is a 4-H Project?

A "project" is simply a topic that you can explore. There are over 150 projects to choose from, including photography, foods and nutrition, dogs, "horseless" horse, and the environment. 4-H projects teach more than just project skills; they teach leadership, citizenship, and teamwork. See page 20 for more information!

What is a 4-H Member Expected to Do?

- ♦ When you join 4-H, you are expected to attend your club's meetings and enroll in at least one 4-H project.
- 4-H members are encouraged to share what they have learned in their projects by displaying their work at a local Fair, Tri-County Performing Arts Festival, or by giving a public demonstration. Each of these is an opportunity for 4-H members to achieve recognition and awards.
- Clubs organize community service projects and host events and activities. Members are encouraged to participate in these community projects.
- ◆ 4-H members are encouraged to keep a record through pictures and stories of their 4-H experiences throughout the 4-H year. These record books are turned in to club leaders in the fall and then returned to members for a lasting memory of their 4-H years. See more information on record books on page 22.
- All clubs are unique and may have different expectations of their members beyond this general list, so talk with your general leader for more information.







Who Supports the 4-H Program?

The 4-H Program is a partnership between the University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension, the United States Department of Agriculture, and Dunn County. The role of the Extension 4-H Program Educator is:

- Provide educational support to 4-H volunteers in the county. This involves training, counseling, and advising all 4-H clubs and leaders in Dunn County on a continuing basis.
- ◆ Teach educational programs which support the goals of the 4-H program and provide youth and adult leaders with University resources which can contribute to their understanding and successful participation in the 4-H Program.
- ♦ Respond to emerging needs on positive youth development, and expand access to 4-H locally.

The 4-H Goal

The 4-H Youth Development program will be youth centered, meeting the need of the individual through an open, mentoring environment which recognizes youth as equal partners in decision making and leadership.



4-H Symbols and Traditions

The 4-H Motto

The new 4-H motto, "To Make The Best Better", was originally proposed by Miss Carrie Harrison, a botanist in the Bureau of Plant Industry. It was officially adopted by leaders who attended the first National 4-H Club Camp in 1927. It has remained the same through the years.

The 4-H Colors

Green and white are the 4-H colors. The white background of the 4-H flag symbolizes purity; the green 4-H emblem is nature's most common color and is the color of springtime.

The 4-H Slogan:

The slogan, "To Learn by Doing" is the cornerstone of the 4-H Program. Kids learn best by being actively involved in their learning.

The 4-H Grows True Leaders Campaign:

"A true leader leads by example, works well with others, tackles tough challenges head-on and sticks with a job until it's done. 4-H Emblem

The emblem is a four-leaf clover with an "H" in each leaf. The letters in the emblem stand for Head, Heart, Hands, and Health. Utilizing this model, the 4-H program helps youth development.

Head

4-H teaches members how to think as team members and leaders through individual projects and community service. Members develop an open mind about issues facing kids today. 4-H kids learn about the world around them, and how to fit into the future.

Heart

Being a kid can be tough. 4-H helps kids accept the responsibilities of citizenship; determine values and attitudes to live by, and teaches kids to learn how to work with others and make new friends.

Hands

Youth learn better by doing. 4-H members learn by using their hands and direct experiences to explore areas of interest. 4-H also helps kids develop respect and concern for others through community service.

Health

4-H helps kids make healthy choices about all areas of their lives so that they can feel good about themselves as adults. It also teaches kids to protect the well-being of others as well as themselves.

4-H Membership

I. Age categories as youth grow with 4-H explained:

<u>Cloverbuds</u>: Youth in grades K-2. Cloverbuds are enrolled solely in Cloverbud projects.

<u>Members:</u> Youth in grades 3 and up participate as regular members. Youth continue to be eligible for membership through the year following their graduation from high school.

- II. Club members should attend at least 50% of the club meetings in order to remain a member, with parents attending as many meetings as possible. Specific clubs will have different requirements about attendance, please contact the club leader
- III. Club dues range from \$3 to \$10, depending on the club.
- IV. Families must re-enroll in 4-H Online each fall. Look for information on our website under 4-H Resources.

The Critical 4-H Experience Elements

The 4-H Program strives to provide 8 elements during a 4-H experience that are divided into 4 concepts:

Belonging

- Positive Relationship with a caring adult
- An inclusive environment
- A safe environment

Independence

- Opportunity to see oneself as an active participant in the future
- Opportunity for selfdetermination

Mastery

- Engagement in Learning
- Opportunity for Mastery

Generosity

 Opportunity to value and practice service for others

What is the Older Youth Opportunity Packet?

This is a packet full of information on camps, trips, awards, state teams, and leadership opportunities for 4-H members in grades 7-12. Information on application deadlines and potential financial assistance is also included.

What is the 4-H Achievement Award, Leadership Award, and Citizenship Award?

4-H members (grades 7 & above) are eligible to apply for these awards. These awards are given to members who demonstrate excellence in these (achievement, leadership, and citizenship) key areas through their 4-H project work and activities as well as other participation in the community as a whole.

What is the 4-H Key Award?

The highest 4-H Award given, it recognizes 4-H'ers that have demonstrated growth in their 4-H involvement, development and applied their leadership skills and actively participated in the functions of their 4-H club & community. Recipients must have completed 8th grade and have been a 4-H member for at least 3 years.

What are Project Awards?

Project Awards are given to members who excelled in their project work throughout the year. The awards are given based off of member Record Books, and the number of awards given are based on project enrollment.

Scholarships

Four college scholarships are awarded to Dunn County 4-H members. The application can be found on the 4-H Resources page online. Be sure to look at the deadlines and apply on time.

The Dunn County Fair is from July 26th—30th, 2023 The county fair is a fun way to show the entire community the skills you have learned through 4-H, but not the only way. The Dunn County 4-H Leaders Council

Purpose

The Dunn County 4-H Leaders Council assists in the development and advancement of programs that encourage the positive development of youth in Dunn County. The Council has five main points of purpose including (1) to improve, foster, promote and develop the educational 4-H program of Dunn County; (2) to provide an opportunity for the leaders of Dunn County 4-H Clubs to unite their educational activities and programs; (3) to create youth and adult partnerships that will support the purposes of the Dunn County 4-H program; (4) to support community involvement by youth and adults participating in the Dunn County 4-H program; and (5) to set policies, generate and provide financial and other support for 4-H events, activities and educational programs.

Structure and Meetings

The Leaders Council meet at least 4 times per year. The Council consists of one adult representative per chartered club or major program area (and potentially one youth representative per club or major program area). While Youth Representatives have no voting rights they are welcome and encouraged to attend.

Finances

The Council oversees the Pie Social at the Dunn County Fair, holds a golf fundraiser, and sells plat books through county offices to raise money for support of the 4-H program. 4-H clubs are responsible for providing youth and adults to run the Pie Social one or more shifts during the fair, volunteering for the golf tournament, and sell ads for the plat book when the new books are produced every 3 years. The pie social and plat book sales provide financial support for camps, leader and member recognition, scholarships, judges, awards, leader training opportunities, educational materials and more.

Youth Leadership

In 4-H, youth grow in commitment and responsibility by taking on leadership roles. Some opportunities include but are not limited to:

Club Officers

Officers work together with their club leaders in establishing their specific roles and responsibilities. Clubs will usually have a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and historian/reporter.

Youth Activities Council (formerly Teen Leaders)

The Youth Activities Council is a countywide youth organization for 4-H member in grades 7—12. They take an active part in leading county activities. By doing this, they grow, mature & learn leadership skills. The Youth Activates Council also plans and participates in social events and service projects.

4-H Camp Counselor

Working as a camp counselor can be a genuinely rewarding experience! Plus, it can be a great resume builder. This is an excellent leadership opportunity for older youth who like to work with younger youth. Watch for applications in the spring or contact the 4-H Educator directly!



Adult Volunteers and Leaders

Please note: Extension Volunteers are trained and must pass a background check every 4 years. Please contact the office if you might like to join the volunteers that make 4-H happen.

Activity/Event Volunteer

 Provide leadership/organization for an activity or event and/ or participate as a committee member

Adult Advisor/Chaperone

- Work with a team of adult advisors and 4-H Youth Development staff to ensure youth have a safe and positive educational experience
- Adults interested in state level chaperone and coordination responsibilities must complete an Adult Advisor Application
 - State level experiences may include: Citizenship Washington Focus, Space Camp, National 4-H Congress.

Chaperones – for 4-H youth development experiences must have completed the Youth Protection Process; be enrolled 4-H volunteer leaders and be over 21 years of age (for some experiences adults must be over 25). In 2022 chaperones may need to complete additional Youth Mental Health training if planning to help with overnight activities.

Club Enrollment Coordinator

 Provide leadership for members and adult volunteers who are enrolling in the club or group organization

Club Leader

- Includes: Club leader, Co-organizational Leader, Co-General Leader, Organizational Leader, and General Leader
- Provide leadership to the club or group organization

Committee Volunteer

- Provide leadership for a committee and/or participate as a member of a committee
- Create educational experiences for all youth engaged in the program

Project Leader

 Provide leadership and organization to the project group who is learning about a specific topic. For example: photography, arts, foods, community service, rocketry and robotics, gardening, rabbits, dairy, etc.

Parents

The idea of getting youth and adults involved together is one of the basic tenets of 4-H. Parents have the opportunity to share their experiences and knowledge with 4-H members. A home can become a school, laboratory or meeting place in various ways.

For every successful 4-H'er, there is a caring and supportive adult available (in most cases this is a parent). In the same manner, for every strong 4-H club, there are parents who feel strongly about being a part of the club process and operation.

Parents can participate in the following ways:


- Becoming a certified 4-H Volunteer

- Providing assistance to the general and project leaders
- Serving on a club or county committee of your choice
- Offering your skills and talents. Parents make great project leaders!
- Providing transportation
- · Chaperoning or advising trips

This is just a short list of what you can do as a parent. Ask your General Leader about other ways you can help!

The most important role of adults in 4-H is to support their children in the commitments they make, help them think through decisions, and assist them in reaching their goals.

By making 4-H a family affair, parents and adults can assist the youth of today to become tomorrow's leaders.

Dunn County Enrollment Information

Enrollment Basics

New 4-H families may enroll at any time. However, in order to participate in the Dunn County 4-H fair and 4-H softball, members must be enrolled by **May 1st.**

November 15th

Re-enrollments due at the Extension Office. Select projects you are interested in.

May 1st

Deadline for new members to join 4-H and still be able to exhibit at the Dunn County Fair in the Junior Division. Enrollments must be in the Extension office by this date. This is also the **final date to choose projects!**

After May 1st

You may still join 4-H, but will not be allowed to play softball or exhibit at the Dunn County Fair in the Junior Division for the current year.

A "project" is simply a topic that you can explore. On the Wisconsin 4-H project pages, you'll find descriptions and resources on a wide variety of major topics. You can even create your own!

How to Enroll

Enrolling in 4-H in Dunn County is very easy!

Log on to: wi.4honline.com



Depending on if you are a new member or a returning member, there are variations as to how to enroll within the online system.

1. New Enrollment:

If you are interested in joining a 4-H club, contact the Extension Office or a General Leaders of the club for information. When joining, clubs will instruct you to log on to **wi.4honline.com** and complete the registration process. **Be sure to save your password!**

2. Re-Enrollment:

An individual who belonged to 4-H last year will receive a notification that re-enrollment is required for the new year. Log on to **wi.4honline.com** and log in with the same account information used to create your profile.

Information from last year will roll over. Please verify the information is correct, that you have a family email address, edit your project listing (if needed), and submit. Double check the family email for typos as this is how we will contact you.

NOTE: New volunteer leaders must complete the Volunteer Orientation process, in addition to filling out the online enrollment process. Volunteer enrollment needs to be done every year. We take safety seriously. Dunn County 4-H Volunteers are mandated reporters and have passed a state background check.

RECORD BOOKS

All people, young and old, must keep records of one thing or another. Think of the things you must record—the meeting next week, your appointment with the doctor, exams at school, and money you spend on clothes and school supplies. Record keeping is simply a way of remembering something for the future. 4-H record keeping prepares you for life!

Records help you benefit in ways that are harder to see, yet are very important.

- ✓ Learn how to identify your goals and set priorities.
- ✓ Establish good organizational and planning skills.
- Develop responsibility in record keeping.
- ✓ Learn if money is made or lost.
- ✓ Explore careers and jobs.
- ✓ Learn to compare and evaluate success or failure.
- Experience personal satisfaction and growth through completion of a worthwhile task.

When you keep accurate records you will have a complete story, telling what projects you took, leadership positions you held, and activities you participated in.

Requirements

All members should complete a record book. Members in grades 3-5 may complete a Junior version of the record book. Cloverbuds are not required to complete a record book but are encouraged to.

PRO TIP: Start your 4-H record book NOW, and keep records throughout the year! It will make the job of compiling your 4-H record book easier at the end of the year! Refer to https://dunn.extension.wisc.edu/4-h-youth-development/record-books/ for more information!
