### SOUTH CENTER

Cedarlings – **Oct.** Cultural Arts: Julia d'Angelo Woodford gave a report on the financial impact cultural arts have on the State of Wisconsin. 3% of the revenue Wisconsin receives come from cultural arts.

Health: Julia reported Mayo has a new referral system. Referrals need to go through a Referral team rather than through your doctor. She also told us about Mayo's Patience Experience Team. Ideas to improve the patience experience can be shared with the team. International/Public Info:: Melanie Yager talked about heath care plan issues. Medicare Advantage Plans (MAP) inflate diagnosis to take in more money from Medicare. Over billing "fraud" amounts to about \$25 Billion a year. United Health Care is being taken to court since they hold 22% of the MAP but receive 40% of the payments.

We discussed having the club cover the dues of certain members. Historically, we have covered dues of members in nursing homes. Betty Beguhn has been a member for over 60 yrs. We decided to create a membership category of "Golden" member where the club covers the membership dues.

Club Christmas Party will be held Dec. 21,12p at Exit 45. Those who wish to participate in a cookie exchange should bring at least 1 doz. cookies. There will also be an optional \$10 gift exchange. Members may also bring Christmas cards to distribute to each other.
