NW International Chair Jean Kelly reported the 2023 ACWW (Associated County Women of the World) theme is "Orange the World". The focus in on abuse awareness. Five Dunn County members, 3 from Popple Creek, attended the Spring District Meeting Apr 27 at Centuria in Polk County. Ladies of Polk County provided a variety of salads, breads and desserts for the luncheon. A librarian presented "How to Preserve HCE records"

Four club members participated in club tour of Amish greenhouse at Sheldon, a Mennonite greenhouse, had lunch at Ted's, and a large metals decor enterprise and the Bird's Nest gift shop at Holcombe. Chris Lorenzen reported making 7 quilts which she donated to groups in Texas. She also made a Christmas quilt which was given to Hope Haus in Lano, TX. She is working on the HCE quilt for the raffle and has 75 hours and \$350 worth fabric in it.

Delores Falkner was honored with a blue ribbon on her quilt entry and all enjoyed Patti Stangel's presentation about the Wildlife Rehab and Release Organization.

Cedarlings-Apr: April: Health – Julia d'Angelo-Woodford passed out Lifestyle Change Options from Mayo. There is the LEAD Program that stands for Lifestyle Education & Alternatives to Dieting Program., the LIT Program that stands for Live it Together, the Mayo Clinic Diet, and the Patient Education weight solutions program.

International – Melanie Yager talked about whether there would be more energy use in 2050 than in 2021. We all thought we would. However, Melanie shared the predictions indicate we will be using less energy due to more efficiency. Electric cars will have a large impact on reducing energy use. <u>Bonus Category Entry Reminder:</u> Since there were not any entries submitted for the "Bonus Category". We decided at the Spring Fling to give additional time for our members to enter this category. Anyone wanting to enter the bonus category must bring their entries to be dropped off at the Dunn County Fairgrounds any time during the SET UP of our annual HCE Book Sale which is usually 1-2 days before the fair begins. The entries will be judged by Elaine Villeneuve sometime during the Book Sale and 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winner will be awarded ribbons. The 1st place winner will move on to the state level competition held in Sept at the HCE State Convention. All entries including winners need to be picked up by the participants by the end of the last day of the book sale on July 17th.

<u>Bonus Category Entry Details</u>: The title of the bonus category is "Driftless Dreaming - Build a Beehive". There are no other details on requirements other than some size restrictions for this category: The base must be no larger than 10" X 10" with the maximum height of 20". Other than that, it is open to your artistic interpretation.

State Art Finalist Drop-Off Instructions: If you are one of the finalists who has entries which will go on to compete at the state level, you or your club president will need to drop off your artwork to Julia d'Angelo-Woodford on Sept 14 at our Executive Board Meeting which is held at the Government Center Building (Lower Level Rm 60) from 1pm to 3pm. Please make sure your artwork has your name, phone #, Name of club, and address taped, stuck, or pinned to it. Please make sure your artwork meets the required state guidelines for submission.
