### Living with Changes in Income.

Living with Changes in Income was presented on Feb. 26 by Lana Anderson. Lana is a former UW-Extension Family Living Educator and a member of the Popple Creek club. Six members attended the presentation.

Many things can impact our income including loss of a spouse, retirement, increases in health care costs. Some things can be planned, such as retirements, but others cannot.

We were advised "to pay yourself first," like putting money away for a future retirement first before spending money on discretionary items. We also need to avoid credit card debt. Interest rates are extremely high.

In order to protect ourselves from the unexpected – such as sudden death of a spouse - we need to know where to find records of things such as bank accounts, computer passwords, credit cards, safety deposit boxes and regular expenses that need to be paid. We were given handouts to fill in itemizing these things.

We were also advised to make sure we have beneficiaries on our accounts in order to avoid probate.

**Ideal-Feb**.: Pres. Elaine thanked Jean Langlois for coordinating the January Holiday Lunch that was held at the Great Escape and to B. Kneer for the fun game (Blank Slate) that we played.

Members were happy to receive a copy of November's Ideal Club minutes in their email. That practice will continue. J.Thull volunteered to read the February book for Bookworms. J. Langlois volunteered to be the lunch coordinator from the Ideal Club for some lunches for the Habitat For Humanity Women's Build. J. Thull will contact her when lunch is needed and then she will contact members to bring something. There was some discussion and confusion around Patti Stangl's Wildlife Refuge project which has been the county project. Members thought that donating at the Spring Fling last May fulfilled the commitment. How long are we committed for? Was this the project for 2023? J. Thull and E. Villeneuve volunteered to attend the Leader Training on Monday, February 26 at 1pm.

Ideal-Mar.: J. Thull attended the February 26 training on "Handling Financial Change" by Lana Anderson. Each member received a copy of the handouts and J. Thull covered the highlights which included not removing deceased from their bank account for at least a year, keeping a written copy of all passwords and documents. She also shared information on the NOK Box for important info. There was quite a bit of discussion. J. Langlois volunteered to read the March Bookworms book. E. Villeneuve reported that she read 12 books and scored them for the 2024-2025 school year J. Thull shared information on the CV Habitat For Humanity home and the family selection process. **New Business:** There was some discussion and confusion around Patti Stangl's Wildlife Refuge project which has been the county project.

Popple Creek – Jan. Donations for the County's project this year to Wildlife Rescue and Rehab were collected. Donations for Colfax Sr. Living were also collected and delivered by Geri. Geri taught the residents how to make Guardian Angels on ribbon. Lana shared quick facts about Alzheimer's disease. About 1 in 9 people age 65 or older is living with Alzheimer's; almost 2/3 of American living with Alzheimer's are women; more than 6 million Americans are living with Alzheimer's. There have been several disease-modifying drugs and in 2020 a simple blood test for earlier evaluation of Alzheimer's disease. Diabetes-associated episodes of low blood sugar has been linked to an increase risk of the disease.

Geri read two encouraging and up lifting pieces, "Don't Quit" and "Beautiful Ten Lines".

**Popple Creek-Feb**.: We met at Connie's. Roll call was taken with members sharing an act of kindness she had given recently. Geri made and delivered 45 Valentine Cards to the Colfax Senior Living Center. They love receiving cards. Two bags of items for Wildlife Rescue and Rehab were collected; and 3 bags of items for the Activity Department for Colfax Sr. Living. The group decided that these two were enough projects for us to work on this year.

**Popple Creek -Mar.:** Donations collected for Wildlife Rescue and Rahab and the Sr. Living Center Activity Dept. They continue to need Bingo prizes, goodies, Bingo dimes, toiletry items needed that are no longer provided by the center. We also included jewelry, gloves, sox, etc.

Geri read about Blue Monday and Tuesday (clothes washing and ironing). Remember bluing on wash day? It was an article from The Country Today's Yesterday Section.

### Elk Meadow-Jan-Mar. -. In



January, club members reviewed the list of income and expenses for 2023 and discussed possible

activities for 2024. These included collecting a monetary donation of \$100 for Fierce Freedom in January, food items for the local food pantry in February and a monetary donation to The Wildlife and Rehab Center in Colfax in March. A donation was also made to Elk Mound PTO for the spring carnival. April's donation will be to Bridge to Hope/Winter Haven. It was decided to have a summer potluck picnic in July as the club does not have regular meetings during the summer months. We will have a club white elephant sale in May and continue to collect books for the DC Fair book sale.

**Cedarlings -Jan.:** Mary Baier reported on the progress of the "Read to Me" program for 3-yearolds. She passed around some of the books which have been received and she described their use and distribution

**Cedarlings -Feb.:** Vicki Jess reported 15% - 20% of muscle mass is lost by women 20 years old and older by the normal aging processes. Recommendations to gain muscle mass include strength training and walking. 800 IU of Vitamin D per day is recommended. 100 grams of protein per day are recommended. We also discussed the Habitat for Humanity project overseen by Janine Thull. We decided to provide lunch for the work crew one time and see how that goes before committing to more lunches. **Cedarlings -Mar**.: Melanie Yager shared information about Linda Thomas-Greenfield, our US Representative to the United Nations. Margaret shared information from the League of Women Voters concerning the 2 referendum questions that will be on the April 2 ballot. Mary Baier reported reading to two groups of 3 yr-olds at the kick-off of the "Read to Me" program.
