Educational Programs that are to be brought back to the counties. We are required to offer at least one.

Christie Pittman, Nadine Schlough and Julia d'Angelo-Woodford had entries in the State Cultural and Textile Arts show. All did well.

The two Educational Programs offered this year are "Milk, Mail, and Medications – *Navigating Care Roles*" and "Social Isolation and Loneliness"

"Milk, Mail, and Medications" focuses on different types of caregiving and tools caregivers can use to help with the challenges.

"Social Isolation and Loneliness" focuses on the risks of social isolation and loneliness. These include a higher risk of premature death, higher risk of heart disease and stroke, higher risk of dementia among other things. The program also goes into what we can do to avoid social isolation and loneliness.

At our October All-Member meeting, we will decide whether we want to present one or both of these programs in 2025.
