It is with sorrow that the members of Popple Creek HCE announce the passing of Nancy Ann Johnson of Colfax, who passed away on March 18. She was a member of PC Homemakers for 67 years; the last years as an honorary member. In 2017 Nancy was recognized as a Diamond member at the state convention as a 60 - year member. Nancy was a gracious hostess. She hosted a "Come as You Are" breakfast in 1963 where many of the ladies showed up in their nightgowns. During the years she served her club in the offices of president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. Nancy also served as county secretary. She attended

leader training meetings which she brought back to the club. Nancy was a planner and encourager. She worked on club quilts, the two Popple Creek banners (1976 & 2007), the committee planning the county celebration of 50th Anniversary of Homemakers in 1989, the Farm Progress Days in Dunn County in 1998, read in Bookworms at Colfax Head Start and contributed to outreach projects of children of club members, the Colfax nursing home and community food pantry. Nancy and Elaine Sundby volunteered for many years during judging at the Colfax Free Fair. Nancy also participated in College Week for Women and in the Northwest district of HCE.

CLUB NOTES

Baxterville - Jan: We filled out our program books and made plans for our annual quilt. It will be a farm animal quilt using a friendship pattern. Each member makes a block and at the end of the year, one of our members takes home the quilt.

Baxterville - Feb: Lori Boesl brought sour dough starters for each of us. She taught us how to feed the sour dough and provided us with some sour dough recipes.

Baxterville - Mar: We made fabric shamrocks.

Cedarlings - Jan: The Read to Me program for 3-yr olds update included the books that had been ordered, funds were in order, and volunteers were signed up for the spring dates in the classrooms. Educational reports included a reminder to use care where there is ice, a review of our national situation regarding undocumented immigrants, and a calendar of

community events we could attend. We discussed the possibility of the Dunn County HCE pie sale at one of the Ludington Guard Band concerts to raise money for Bookworms. We also discussed the Holiday Tea gift basket and how to cover the cost.

Cedarlings - Feb: Our educational reports included a reminder to keep emergency supplies in our cars during winter weather, and an interesting report about how a 3-D printer was used to create a model of a titanium bone-replacement in an elbow. We discussed ecofriendly diets and sustainability diets, designed to lower carbon emissions. These include choosing food sources which are not waterintensive, omitting foods which have been transported long distances, and minimizing meat products which require longer times for animals to mature so they are fed larger amounts over longer times. This results in more damage to pasture land, creates more pollution in water, and adds more passed gas to the air.

Cedarlings - Mar: Our educational reports included a reminder to be careful in snow-melting conditions, a discussion of the measles outbreak, and a brief review of the federal budget and the national debt.

Elk Meadow - Jan-Mar:

We did not meet in January due to the extreme cold on meeting day. In 2025, we have welcomed 3 new members to our club, Betty Heltne, Jayette Giere and Ruth Smith. In February, our monetary donations were directed to Fierce Freedom and in March to Wildlife Rehab. The donation for April will be to Bridge to Hope. Members also approved donations to Elk Mound

PTO and the Elk Mound graduation party.

Basic Cell Phones Feb 24

Presented by Dr. Tyler Thomas, UW-Stout. Twelve members attended the presentation. Topics included data security, apps, updates, camera, flashlight and silencing the phone.

We were told some apps include malware so you may want virus protection if you download lots of apps. The safest place to get apps is through Google Play Store because they check them out. The Google Play Store has some virus protection apps. We were shown how to remove apps.

We were told updates are needed to fix problems that arise when new threats come up or to fix problems discovered by those using the phone. Most of the time these updates take place automatically.
